- 1. Read the passage given below.
  - 1. Wangari Maathai's passion for trees and concern for the environment grew out of her love for her village. She learnt to respect nature from her grandmother and her family. She spoke about a large fig tree near her family home, that her grandmother said was sacred. She would get water for the house from the springs protected by the roots of that tree.
  - 2. When Wangari was young her family saw that she was very bright and sent her to school. She was smart enough to win a scholarship to study in the USA. After finishing college, she came back to Kenya to teach at the University of Nairobi. She was the first woman to get a PhD in Africa, and the first woman to head a department in a university. Wangari was very successful and could have led a peaceful and comfortable life. On her return, she found that widespread deforestation had caused terrible malnutrition and famine throughout the land.
  - 3. Wangari wondered what happened to that lush land. Why couldn't women get clean water and healthy food for their families? Going down to the roots of the problem, she realized that the land had to be reforested. She decided to plant trees. She began the Green Belt Movement in a small nursery in her garden which later grew into a huge organization that has planted millions of trees in Africa.
  - 4. Deforestation had occurred in many other places in the world, because forests had been cut down to grow cash crops for export, or to build high rise buildings. Thus, the poor and the disadvantaged, got pushed into poverty and hunger. Connecting the dots, Wangari realized that to fix the environment, she had to fight for people's rights and democracy. She protested against schemes that could harm the environment. She was mistreated and jailed many times. But she persevered with her fight. When asked what kept her fighting, she told the story of the hummingbird that her mother had told her.
  - 5. Once there was a terrible forest fire. All the animals stood on the edge of the forest, transfixed. As they watched the forest burning, they felt powerless, except for this one hummingbird. The hummingbird took what water it could in its tiny beak and threw it on the blaze. As it whirred its wings and flew again and again from the stream to the fire, the animals watched helplessly, including much bigger animals like the elephant, which could have carried a lot of water in its trunk. They told the hummingbird, "What do you think you can do? You are too little and the fire is so big. How can you help?" The little hummingbird turned to them without wasting any time, and said, "I am doing the best I can. This is what all of us should do."
  - 6. "I will be that hummingbird," said Wangari Maathai. And she was all her life. It has made a difference. She said in her Nobel Peace Prize acceptance speech, "sustainable development, democracy and peace are indivisible."
